


HALIFAX AS A SHARE OF NOVA SCOTIA, SELECT INDICATORS, 2014











Planning & Development Construction Value by Type (2011 to 2015)


Problem likely more serious than report suggests, panel hears






Housing Continuum

 Households with income of \$17,065 or less per year not able to afford market rents





AHWG Strategic 5 Year Plan
